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New political map for Tonbridge & Malling Borough Council

Tonbridge & Malling is set to have new boundaries for its council wards.

The Local Government Boundary Commission is the independent body that draws these boundaries. It has reviewed Tonbridge & Malling to make sure councillors will represent about the same number of electors, and that ward arrangements will help the council work effectively.

The Commission has published final recommendations for changes in Tonbridge & Malling. It says residents should be represented by 44 councillors. This is ten fewer than under the existing arrangements.

The 44 councillors should represent one one-councillor ward, eleven two-councillor wards, and seven three-councillor wards across the council area. There will be 19 wards, five fewer than there are now. The boundaries of all wards should change; none will stay the same.

Publishing the recommendations Professor Colin Mellors, Chair of the Commission, said:

"We are very grateful to people in Tonbridge & Malling. We looked at all the views they gave us. They helped us improve our earlier proposals.

"We believe the new arrangements will guarantee electoral fairness while maintaining local ties."

160 people and organisations made comments to help decide the new wards. Changes in response to what local people said include:

- Cage Green ward will be renamed Cage Green & Angel and shall encompass the area east of the High Street following persuasive community evidence received by the Commission
- West Peckham Parish shall be placed in a ward with East Peckham Parish,
 Mereworth Parish and Wateringbury Parish to reflect community evidence

Parliament now needs to agree the changes. The new arrangements will then apply for the 2023 council elections.

- Create boundaries that are appropriate, and reflect community ties and identities
