
News Release from the Local Government Boundary Commission for England

Have your say on a new political map for Waverley Borough Council.

New boundaries are being proposed for council wards in Waverley Borough Council.

The Local Government Boundary Commission wants to hear what residents and local organisations think about the proposals. A 10-week consultation on the proposals will run until 13 December 2021.

The Commission is the independent body that draws these boundaries. It is reviewing Waverley to make sure councillors will represent about the same number of electors, and that ward arrangements will help the council work effectively.

The Commission has published proposals for changes to Waverley. It is proposing that there should be 22 wards: eight three-councillor wards, 12 two-councillor wards,

and two single-councillor wards across the council area. All ward boundaries except Farnham Castle will be changing.

Proposed changes include:

- Witley parish will now have three dedicated councillors representing a new Milford & Witley ward. At present the parish is split between three wards. The Commission believes this will provide for more effective and convenient local government.
- No wards in Farnham will cross the A31. The Commission considers that this will better reflect community interests and identities.

Launching the consultation Professor Colin Mellors, Chair of the Commission, said:

"We want people in Waverley to help us.

"We have drawn up proposals for new wards in Waverley. We want to make sure these new electoral arrangements reflect communities. We also want them to be easy to understand and convenient for local people.

"Residents and local organisations can help us do that. We would like them to let us know whether they agree with our proposals before we take final decisions.

"It's easy to get involved. Go to our website. Or you can e-mail or write to us.

"Just tell us what you think and give us some details why you think that. It's really simple, so do get involved"
