

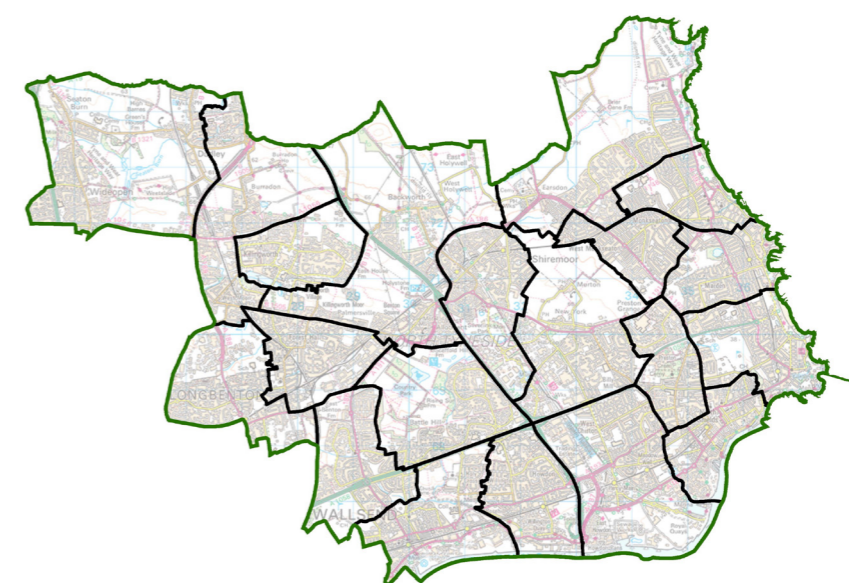
## Our Recommendations

The table lists all the wards we are proposing as part of our final recommendations along with the number of electors in each ward. The table also shows the electoral variances for each of the proposed wards which tells you how we have delivered electoral equality. Finally, the table includes electorate projections for 2028 so you can see the impact of the recommendations for the future.

# North Tyneside Council

## Final Recommendations on the new electoral arrangements



### Who we are

- The Local Government Boundary Commission for England is an independent body set up by Parliament.
- We are not part of government or any political party.
- We are accountable to Parliament through a committee of MPs chaired by the Speaker of the House of Commons.
- Our main role is to carry out electoral reviews of local authorities throughout England.

### Electoral review

An electoral review examines and proposes new electoral arrangements for a local authority, including:

- The total number of councillors representing the council's electors ('council size').
- The names, number and boundaries of wards or electoral divisions.
- The number of councillors for each ward or division.

### Why North Tyneside?

- The Commission has a legal duty to carry out an electoral review of each council in England 'from time to time'.
- North Tyneside Council has not been reviewed since 2002 and the Commission has therefore decided that it should review North Tyneside in advance of the elections in 2024.

### Our proposals

- North Tyneside Council currently has 60 councillors. Based on the evidence we received, we recommend that 60 councillors should serve the council in the future.
- We believe our final recommendations meet our statutory criteria to:
  1. Deliver electoral equality for electors
  2. Reflect community interests and identities
  3. Promote effective and convenient local government

## Summary of our recommendations

We have considered all the submissions we received during our consultation on our draft recommendations.

The final recommendations propose that North Tyneside should have 60 councillors, the same as there are now.

North Tyneside should have 20 wards, the same as there are now. The boundaries of all existing wards should change.

The 60 councillors should represent 20 three-councillor wards across the borough.

Stage of Review	Description
30 August 2022- 7 November 2022	Public consultation on warding arrangements
10 February 2023 - 17 April 2023	Public consultation on draft recommendations
25 July 2023 - 4 September 2023	We carry out a limited further public consultation on our proposals
31 October 2023	Publication of final recommendations
2024	Subject to parliamentary approval - implementation of new arrangements at local elections
