

New political map for Maidstone Borough Council

Maidstone is set to have new boundaries for its council wards.

The Local Government Boundary Commission is the independent body that draws these boundaries. It has reviewed Maidstone to make sure councillors will represent about the same number of electors, and that ward arrangements will help the council work effectively.

The Commission has published final recommendations for changes in Maidstone. It says residents should be represented by 49 councillors. This is six fewer than the current arrangements.

There will be 22 wards, four fewer than there are now, representing three single-councillor wards, 11 two-councillor wards and eight three-councillor wards. The boundaries of 21 wards should change; only Staplehurst will stay the same.

Publishing the recommendations Professor Colin Mellors, Chair of the Commission, said:

“We are very grateful to people in Maidstone. We looked at all the views they gave us. They helped us improve our earlier proposals.

“We believe the new arrangements will deliver electoral fairness while maintaining local ties.”

236 people and organisations made comments to help decide the new wards. Changes in response to what local people said include:

- Stockley Parish will be included in Boxley Downs ward
- The Coombe Farm Estate will be united in Tovil ward

The changes become law once Parliament has approved them. Staff at the council will ensure that the arrangements are in place for the 2024 elections.
