

Have your say on a new political map for Havant Borough Council

New boundaries are being proposed for council wards in Havant Borough Council.

The Local Government Boundary Commission wants to hear what residents and local organisations think about the proposals. A 10-week consultation on the proposals will run until 18 July 2022.

The Commission is the independent body that draws these boundaries. It is reviewing Havant to make sure councillors will represent about the same number of electors, and that ward arrangements will help the council work effectively.

The Commission has published proposals for changes to Havant. It is proposing that there should be 12 wards with three councillors per ward.

Proposed changes include:

- The creation of two new wards covering the Leigh Park area to replace the existing two-councillor wards.
- A new Hayling West & Langstone ward reflecting community interests and providing for improved electoral equality.

Launching the consultation Professor Colin Mellors, Chair of the Commission, said:

"We want people in Havant to help us.

"We have drawn up proposals for new wards in Havant. We want to make sure these new electoral arrangements reflect communities. We also want them to be easy to understand and convenient for local people.

"Residents and local organisations can help us do that. We would like them to let us know whether they agree with our proposals before we take final decisions.

"It's easy to get involved. Go to our website. Or you can e-mail or write to us.

"Just tell us what you think and give us some details why you think that. It's really simple, so do get involved"

The Commission has a dedicated section on its website where people can see the detail of the proposals and comment on the names of wards and their boundaries.

The Local Government Boundary Commission for England is an independent body accountable to Parliament. It recommends fair electoral and boundary arrangements for local authorities in England. In doing so, it aims to:

- Make sure that, within an authority, each councillor represents a similar number of electors
- Create boundaries that are appropriate, and reflect community ties and identities
- Reflect the electoral cycle so that each ward is represented by three councillors
- Deliver reviews informed by local needs, views and circumstances
