

## Our Recommendations

The table lists all the wards we are proposing as part of our final recommendations along with the number of voters in each ward. The table also shows the electoral variances for each of the proposed wards which tells you how we have delivered electoral equality. Finally, the table includes electorate projections for 2027 so you can see the impact of the recommendations for the future.

## Final Recommendations on the new electoral arrangements



### Who we are

- The Local Government Boundary Commission for England is an independent body set up by Parliament.
- We are not part of government or any political party.
- We are accountable to Parliament through a committee of MPs chaired by the Speaker of the House of Commons.
- Our main role is to carry out electoral reviews of local authorities throughout England.

### Electoral review

An electoral review examines and proposes new electoral arrangements for a local authority, including:

- The total number of councillors representing the council's voters ('council size').
- The names, number and boundaries of wards or electoral divisions.
- The number of councillors for each ward or division.

### Why Rushcliffe?

- Rushcliffe Borough Council currently has high levels of electoral inequality: some councillors represent many more - or many fewer - voters than others.
- Therefore the value of your vote, in Rushcliffe Borough Council elections, varies depending on where you live in Rushcliffe.
- We are seeking to improve levels of electoral equality for local voters

### Our proposals

- Rushcliffe Borough Council currently has 44 councillors. Based on the evidence we received, we recommend that 44 councillors should serve the council in the future.
- We believe our final recommendations meet our statutory criteria to:
  1. Deliver electoral equality for voters
  2. Reflect community interests and identities
  3. Promote effective and convenient local government

## Summary of our recommendations

We have considered all the submissions we received during our consultation on our draft recommendations.

The final recommendations propose that Rushcliffe should have 44 councillors, the same as there are now.

Rushcliffe should have 24 wards, a decrease of one. The boundaries of all but two of the existing wards should change.

The 44 councillors should represent six three-councillor wards, eight two-councillor wards, and ten single councillor wards across the borough.

11 May 2021 - 19 July 2021	Public consultation on warding arrangements
5 October 2021 - 13 December 2021	Public consultation on draft recommendations
1 March 2022 - 29 March 2022	Limited further draft consultation in part of the borough
31 May 2022	Publication of final recommendations
May 2023	Subject to parliamentary approval - implementation of new arrangements at local elections
