
Our Recommendations

Final Recommendations on the new electoral arrangements



Who we are

- The Local Government Boundary Commission for England is an independent body set up by Parliament.
- We are not part of government or any political party.
- We are accountable to Parliament through a committee of MPs chaired by the Speaker of the House of Commons.
- Our main role is to carry out electoral reviews of local authorities throughout England.

Electoral review

An electoral review examines and proposes new electoral arrangements for a local authority, including:

- The total number of councillors representing the council's voters ('council size').
- The names, number and boundaries of wards or electoral divisions.
- The number of councillors for each ward or division.

Why Gravesham?

- The Commission has a legal duty to carry out an electoral review of each council in England 'from time to time'.
- Gravesham Borough Council has not been reviewed since 2000 and the Commission has therefore decided that it should review Gravesham in advance of the elections in 2023.

Our proposals

- Gravesham Borough Council currently has 44 councillors. Based on the evidence we received, we recommend that 39 councillors should serve the council in the future.
- We believe our final recommendations meet our statutory criteria to:
 - 1. Deliver electoral equality for voters
 - 2. Reflect community interests and identities
 - 3. Promote effective and convenient local government

Summary of our recommendations

We have considered all the submissions we received during our consultation on our draft recommendations.

The final recommendations propose that Gravesham Borough Council should have 39 councillors, a decrease of five.

Gravesham should have 17 wards, a decrease of one. The boundaries of all of the existing wards should change.

The 39 councillors should represent six three-councillor wards and ten two-councillor wards, and one single-councillor ward across the borough.


