

Our Recommendations

The table lists all the wards we are proposing as part of our final recommendations along with the number of electors in each ward. The table also shows the electoral variances for each of the proposed wards which tells you how we have delivered electoral equality. Finally, the table includes electorate projections for 2028 so you can see the impact of the recommendations for the future.

Final Recommendations on the new electoral arrangements



Who we are

- The Local Government Boundary Commission for England is an independent body set up by Parliament.
- We are not part of government or any political party.
- We are accountable to Parliament through a committee of MPs chaired by the Speaker of the House of Commons.
- Our main role is to carry out electoral reviews of local authorities throughout England.

Electoral review

An electoral review examines and proposes new electoral arrangements for a local authority, including:

- The total number of councillors representing the council's electors ('council size').
- The names, number and boundaries of wards or electoral divisions.
- The number of councillors for each ward or division.

Why Cannock Chase?

- The Commission has a legal duty to carry out an electoral review of each council in England 'from time to time'.
- Cannock Chase Council has not been reviewed since 2000 and the Commission has therefore decided that it should review Cannock Chase in advance of the elections in 2024.

Our proposals

- Cannock Chase Council currently has 41 councillors. Based on the evidence we received, we recommend that 36 councillors should serve the council in the future.
- We believe our final recommendations meet our statutory criteria to:
 1. Deliver electoral equality for electors
 2. Reflect community interests and identities
 3. Promote effective and convenient local government

Summary of our recommendations

We have considered all the submissions we received during our consultation on our draft recommendations.

The final recommendations propose that Cannock Chase should have 36 councillors, a decrease of five.

Cannock Chase should have 12 wards, a decrease of three. The boundaries of all wards will change except Norton Canes.

The 36 councillors should represent 12 three-councillor wards across the district.

24 May 2022 - 1 August 2022	Public consultation on warding arrangements
29 November 2022 - 6 February 2023	Public consultation on draft recommendations
9 May 2023	Publication of final recommendations
May 2024	Subject to parliamentary approval - implementation of new arrangements at local elections
